
## Social Justice Grants Analysis



#### Why General Operating?

- For 2021, we have shifted our grant cycle priorities from program grants to general operating grants so that funds can be used where needed most
- Foster a culture of assessment and adjustment as orgs continue in unprecedented territory
- Emphasis on supporting and strengthening your capacity to carry out your mission
- Decrease your focus on "what will get funded" to what you need to achieve your goals



- Prioritizing general operating support
- Grant range: \$500 \$10,000
- Available amount is approximately \$200,000
- While we cannot provide funding to all Tompkins County Nonprofits in this grant cycle, we play a matchmaking role between the needs that your organization strives to meet and available funding as well as the interests of donor advised funds

The Community Foundation holds many funds, and these reflect a wide variety of interests. Some are specialized and some more general. Because we seek to match needs with donors, we will share the summary of your application with the advisors of our many Donor Advised Funds (over 135 individuals).







- All applications in this grant cycle are reviewed by community represented review teams
- Prefer one application per organization

Preference to fund organizations that did not receive full funding in the spring

In addition, we look for alignment between your work and special issue funds. To help us with this, the application will ask you to indicate whether your request prioritizes any of the following areas:

- Aging
- **Animal Welfare**
- Arts & Culture
- Birth to 3
- Children & Youth
- Community Planning and Design

- Crime Victims and Sexual Assault Survivors
- **Environmental Preservation**
- Food Security
- Women







- What is your organization's mission?
- How is your organization delivering on its mission? What do you need most in the next 12 months to accomplish your mission?
- Tell us about the changing needs of those your organization serves as the pandemic environment continues to change. What new needs are you anticipating? How are you gathering this information?
- What is your organization most proud of during the pandemic as it relates to your mission?
- How has your organization been setting goals to track its progress and what goals do you have for the next year?
- Tell us how you are collaborating with other organizations/entities who share common goals?







Tell us about how your organization's capacity has been affected by COVID-19
and about your ongoing capacity to meet the changing needs that you have
described above (please include federal support received/anticipated, staffing
vacancies, substantial funding changes, program closures/new programs, etc.).

We want to learn more about how your organization addresses diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice. We are aware that many local non-profits are giving increased attention to diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice in their policies and in their work.

- Has your organization modified any of its programs or services to meet DEIJ goals explicitly? If so, how?





#### Instructions

Welcome to your dashboard. Please carefully read the information below. It addresses many common questions and will help you in the application process. For technical assistance, contact Jessie Galbreath Nocera at admin@cftompkins.org.

- 1. Click on one of the sections below to begin.
- 2. You have the option to save your work and to continue and submit at a later time. Be sure to click the "Save" button at the bottom of each section before exiting.
- 3. Each section below, needs to read 100% in order to submit your application. If a section does not read 100%, you missed a required question(s) in that section.
- 4. To avoid losing work, particularly in essay type questions, write your responses in a word processor first. When you have completed your response, then copy and paste into the appropriate question. Note word limits. Be sure to click "Save" after pasting. If word limits have been exceeded, the information may not save properly.
- 5. When you are ready to submit, click the "Final Review and Submit" button to verify your attachments have uploaded correctly and the application contains all the necessary information. You can generate a PDF of your application by clicking on the "Generate PDF" button under "My Applications" tab. You can also click the radio button beside your application and then "Print Application" before you submit to check for errors.
- 6. Please note that you will need to request electronic signatures from your Executive Director and a board officer in order to submit your application. The signers will have two days beyond the due date for the application to respond with an electronic signature. You are able to submit the application as long as the signatures have been "requested".
