





Expanding Philanthropy

\$3.7M

In recent years, giving broadens and deepens across fund types. Tompkins County thrives thanks to engaged philanthropy.

Increased Tax-advantaged Gifts

\$1.5M

Increased number of gifts from external donor advised funds, IRA/QCDs and stock transfers. In 2021, totaling \$1.5M.

Responsive Philanthropy

258%

From 2019 to 2021 CI gifts increased 258% In 2020, 1 in 3 gifts, to COVID-19 Response Fund. In 2021, 1 in 2 gifts (\$1.4M), to Community Impact Funds.












Why a Greater shift to Flexible Support in 2021?

- Shifting our grant cycle priority from program grants to unrestricted grants provided flexible support to be used where needed most
- Foster a culture of assessment and adjustment, building resiliency, as orgs continue in unprecedented territory
- Emphasis on supporting and strengthening organizational capacity to effectively carry out mission





Growth in Staff-Facilitated Grants





Foodnet Meals on Wheels



In 2021, Community Foundation made over \$72,000 in grants to Foodnet Meals on Wheels from 7 different funds



Over \$48,000 was granted from 3
Donor Advised Funds responding to
non-grant cycle requests for kitchen
equipment. Fund advisors appreciated
learning about these emergent needs
as demand for meals increased.



\$5,600 from the COVID-19 Response Fund supported Foodnet's ability to provide meals to families who were food insecure while under quarantine. This need was identified by the Food Task Force Distribution Team which convenes over 15 food serving organizations to fill gaps in services.





21,055 Weekend & Holiday Meals Delivered



Over \$17,000 was provided in unrestricted grants, allowing Foodnet to use funding wherever it was needed most during rapidly changing needs.
